Business Agent, Enterprise Association of Steamfitters, Local 638

Janet *(cover)* is a journeyman steamfitter and is also part of senior leadership in her union. She originally wanted to be a clothing designer, but followed her family tradition into the Steamfitters. She is the first woman to become a Business Agent in Local 638 and is active in legislative and political campaigns in that area. She attended the Long Island Federation Leadership Class in 2014 and has remained active with the Federation.



**ALICE A. COTTERELL** 

Letter Carrier, United States Postal Service, Treasurer, National Association of Letter Carriers, NE NY Branch 358

Alice began employment with the USPS in April 1984 and is currently a Senior Letter Carrier in Schenectady, NY. She was one of the first women City Delivery Carriers in Branch 358. Alice started as a Shop Steward and was then appointed Director of Community Services. She has been the Treasurer for 18 years, acting as the financial steward during a time period that saw the local more than double its region of representation. Alice led the Branch financially through a significant job/membership loss in the recent USPS fiscal crisis.



**ETHEL MATHIS** 

Retired Registered Nurse, St. Elizabeth's Hospital, Board of Directors-Central Region Director of NYSNA

Ethel worked as a drug counselor in impoverished neighborhoods for many years prior to becoming a nurse. She is now a spokesperson for NYSNA on economic and environmental justice issues and has been at the forefront of NYSNA's participation in the Fight for 15 and Single Payer. As an African-American woman, she has been deeply involved in the civil rights struggle. Ethel is a committed union activist who is constantly trying to involve the Union in social and economic justice issues.



**CONNIE FRITZLO** 

Customer Service Representative, PSEGLI, Steward and Executive Board Recording Secretary, IBEW Local 1049

Connie joined the IBEW in 1996 as a Long Island Utility Telephone Collections Representative. Shortly afterward, she was appointed as a Shop Steward of what was then IBEW Local 1381. In 2004, she was elected to the Local 1381 Executive Board and then in 2008, she became the first woman on Local 1049's Executive Board in its 71 year history.

Leader of a major local union in Western New York, Cori is currently involved in the campaign to improve working conditions at the Catholic Health Inc. and is spearheading the advancement of a "community benefits" agreement in the new Medical Corridor in downtown Buffalo. She is an outstanding labor leader who has put herself in the forefront of the social union movement

Dona blazed the trail for female leadership in her union, her community and state. Now retired, she is one of the most active retirees in CWA. Dona has been honored many times for her dedication to the labor movement, including a "Points of Light Award" from President Bill Clinton, designation as Dutchess County Woman of the Year, and the Mother Jones Award from the Hudson Valley Area Labor Federation. She served three terms on the National AFL-CIO Advisory Committee laying the groundwork to form the Area Labor Federations. Dona was the first female President of a CLC in NYS and served in this capacity for 19 years.

Veronica was born in Santiago, Dominican Republic, immigrating to the United States in 2003. She began working in the construction field and specialized as a painter and decorator. In 2011 during the downturn in the economy which hit the construction industry very hard, Veronica became an apprentice with DC9 Painters and Allied Trades Union. Veronica completed her apprenticeship as a painter in June 2015 and soon after became the first female president of Local 18 borough of Manhattan painters. Veronica is now the first female organizer at DC9.



**ERIN B. COVELL**Guidance Counselor, Massena Central Schools, President, Massena Federation of Teachers,

Erin has been a Guidance Counselor for the last nine years and President of the Massena Federation of Teachers since 2013. She was the driving force behind the People Over Profit rally that was held to support Alcoa workers and their families when the company announced it was planning to close the Massena operation. Working with the United Steelworkers local leadership, Erin brought together school administrators, community leaders, elected officials and area labor organizations to launch the rally. The work continues after the rally with the formation of a regional coalition focusing on the economy and job growth in the North Country.

Sergeant, Jamesville Correctional Facility for the Onondaga County Department of Corrections, President, CSEA Local 834




